*P1A = Veteran with a 70 percent or greater service-connected disability or who require nursing home care because of a service-connected disability





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Medical Foster Homes are Unique

- Affordable alternative to nursing home care
- The caregiver's primary residence
- No more than 3 Veterans per home
- Private bedroom for every Veteran
- Veterans receive 24/7 supervision
- Caregivers are trained to meet the unique psychosocial needs of Veterans
- Homemade Meals & Individualized Recreational/Social Opportunities







Foster Families



- Have compassionate and caring hearts
- Come from all walks of life and backgrounds (medical backgrounds are not required)
- Receive ongoing training and support from VA
- Collaborate with VA Staff and Home Based Primary Care (HBPC)





Home Based Primary Care (HBPC)

- A primary care team that goes to the Veteran's home instead of requiring a clinic visit
- For Veterans who need team based in-home support for ongoing diseases and illnesses that affect their health and daily activities
- These Veterans have difficulty making and keeping clinic visits because of their illness
- Is also for Veterans who are isolated or whose caregivers are experiencing burden
- HBPC can be used in combination with other Home and Community Based Services





Homemaker & Home Health Aide (H/HHA)

- Designed to help Veterans remain in their home
- A trained person who can come to the Veteran's home and help with self care and daily activities.
- This person is supervised by a nurse and works for an organization that contracts with VA
- Can also serve Veterans who are isolated or whose caregiver is experiencing burden
- Can be used in combination with other Home and Community Based Services





Respite Care

- For Veterans who need help with activities of daily living whose caregiver is experiencing burden
- Home respite pays for a person to come to the Veteran's home or for a Veteran to go to an adult day health program while their family member takes a break
- Nursing Home Respite pays for a Veteran to go to a nursing home while the family takes a break
- Can be used in combination with other Home & Community Based Services





Adult Day Health Care (ADHC)

- Program where Veterans can go during the day for social activities, peer support, companionship, and recreation
- For Veterans who need help with activities of daily living, are isolated or whose caregiver is experiencing burden
- Can be used in combination with other Home & Community Based Services





Veteran Directed Care (VDC)

- Allows Veterans to receive the Home and Community Based Services they need in a consumer-directed way
- For Veterans who need personal care services and help with activities of daily living
- Veterans are provided a budget for services that mis managed by the Veteran. With the help of a counselor, Veterans hire their own workers to meet their daily care needs to help them remain at home.





Home & Community Based/Purchased Care Services

Purchased Care Services require an assessment to screen for eligibility.

What is Homemaker/Home Health Aide (H/HHA)?

H/HHA is a home based, hands on personal care assistance program to help Veterans remain at home. Aide must assist with personal care tasks. H/HHA is designed to assist with personal care and not home chores. H/HHA has no cost.

What is Respite?

Respite is a home based supervision and assistance program designed to provide a break for a Veteran's caregiver. Aides may assist with ADLs as needed. Respite has a possible co-pay for Veterans less than 10%SC.

What is Adult Day Health Care (ADHC)?

ADHC is a community based day care program to provide respite for caregivers and/or socialization for the Veteran. ADHC is offered for full or half days of care. ADHC has a possible copay for Veterans less than 10% SC.

What is not included in Purchased Care Services?

- Transportation
- Only receiving housekeeping, cooking, or errands
- Medical tasks and monitoring
- Home care (yard work, snow removal, etc.)
- Pet care
- Providing care and assistance for anyone other than the Veteran
